



Live online discussion summary

On December 16, 2021, participants joined panelists Dr. Ardavan Eizadirad, Devon Jones, Brice Baartman, and Sally Abudiab in a live discussion to further explore issues raised in their December webinar. This summary highlights participants' discussions on the following three questions.



How can we close the acheivement or opportunity gap for racialized students and those living in under-resourced communities?

A Centre BIPOC Narratives

Black, Indigenous, and racialized student narratives must be integrated into and amplified by curriculum in order for all students to see themselves and their experiences reflected in classrooms.

B Diversify Education Staff

Schools ought to prioritize the hiring of diverse educators who possess both the ability to connect with students and the desire to de-center eurocentric education practices.

C Introduce Equitable Assessments

Educators should recognize students' unique achievements in more equitable ways (e.g., acknowledging overall student improvement vs letter grades).

D | Implement Wrap-Around Models to **Education**


Teachers must engage with students and their families to gain a broader view of the child's learning experience (e.g., systemic factors that affect learning, such as poverty) and implement support plans for those in need.

E | Create coaching and mentorship opportunities outside formal classrooms

Racialized students need trusted adults they can build relationships with outside of the classroom via extra-curricular activities (e.g., coaches, tutors, mentors)



What are some strategies to make remote and hybrid learning more accessible and inclusive for everyone?










