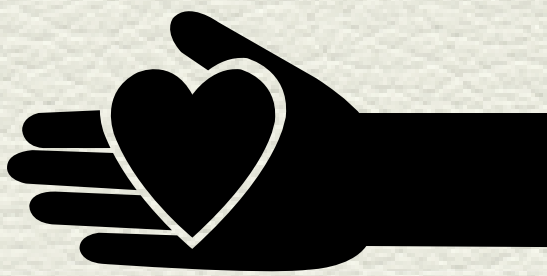
- Somewhat familiar with community-based research working with racialized communities

What actions can allies take to further support community research groups working with racialized communities?

Conduct relational research through community-based practices demonstrating genuine partnership instead of employing traditional research hierarchies

Conduct intervention research that meaningfully supports communities today, rather than exploratory research that may or may not lead to support for communities in the future



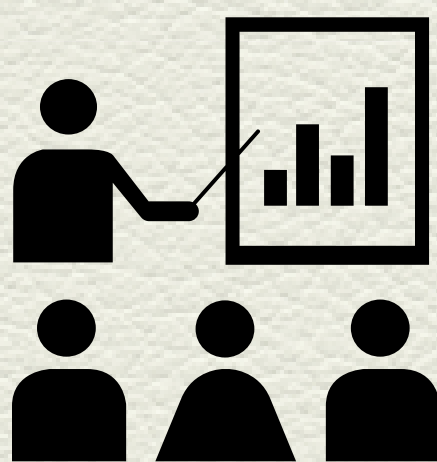

Practice interdisciplinary and intersectoral allyship led by the community to direct attention, funding, and human capital towards the needs of the community

Support intergenerational dialogue, relationship building, and knowledge generation to encourage connections with people across society and deepen understanding of one another

Facilitate education and dialogue among and between white/settler Canadian communities about the challenges facing racialized communities



6

Fund and support the employment of peer-navigators to support racialized individuals when accessing public and private systems, such as health care

Questions to Ponder

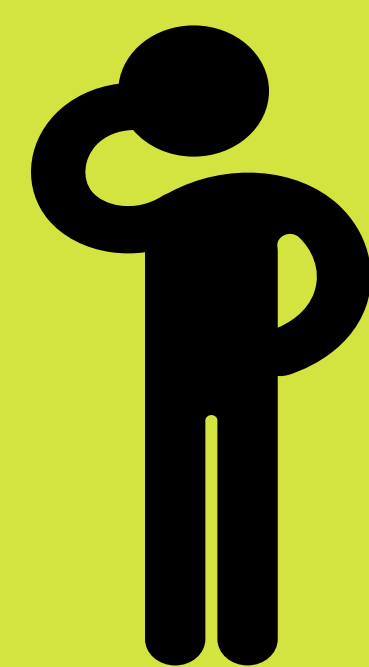
What are best practices for independent researchers and allies to help facilitate communication between marginalized communities and powerful decision makers/ funders?

How can we support the creation of a healthy economy of funding for intervention or relational research outside of our traditional government funding bases?



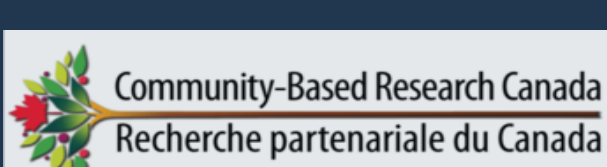
