Strategies to Ensure Research is Community-Driven, Transformative, and Impactful



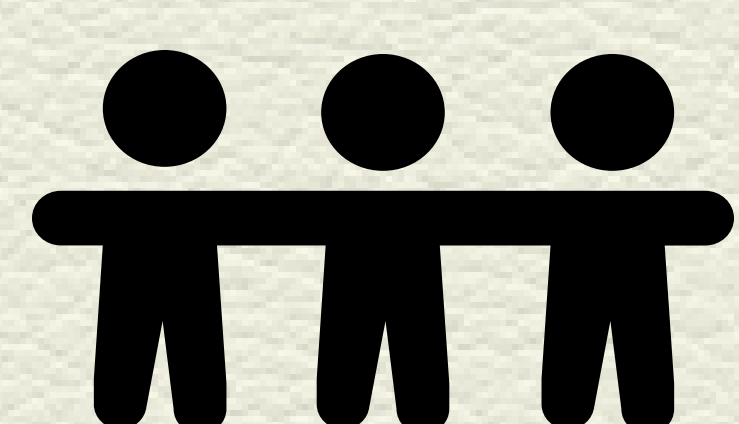
Allow for flexibility in the research design

Be led by the community through all aspects of the research, from design to dissemination

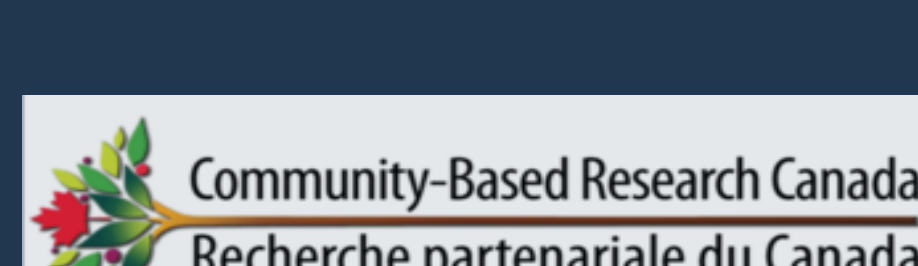
