At its core Shift is a project focused on building solidarity and improving labour practices in participatory research



WHAT IS PARTICIPATORY RESEARCH?

- Participatory forms of research include members of the public or other key stakeholders in research beyond roles as participants
 - Community members, patients, practicing clinicians, policy makers, or any other non-academic partners
- Terms used to describe these methods include:
 - Community-based research (or community-based participatory research)
 - Indigenous community-based research
 - Citizen science
 - Patient-oriented research, or
 - Participatory action research
- We use the term “participatory research” and “community stakeholders” as umbrella terms



Original Objectives

1. Build a multidisciplinary team to investigate the emerging area of participatory employment across different fields of participatory research;
2. Explore how community researchers describe their employment experiences;
3. Develop a typology of participatory employment roles including activities, intensity of engagement, hours and location of work, remuneration, benefits, training, and career trajectories;
4. Describe the human resources practices and policies;
5. Identify current and emerging models of participatory employment such as social enterprises, unions, and cooperatives; and,
6. Select outcomes of interest to community researchers and other key stakeholders.

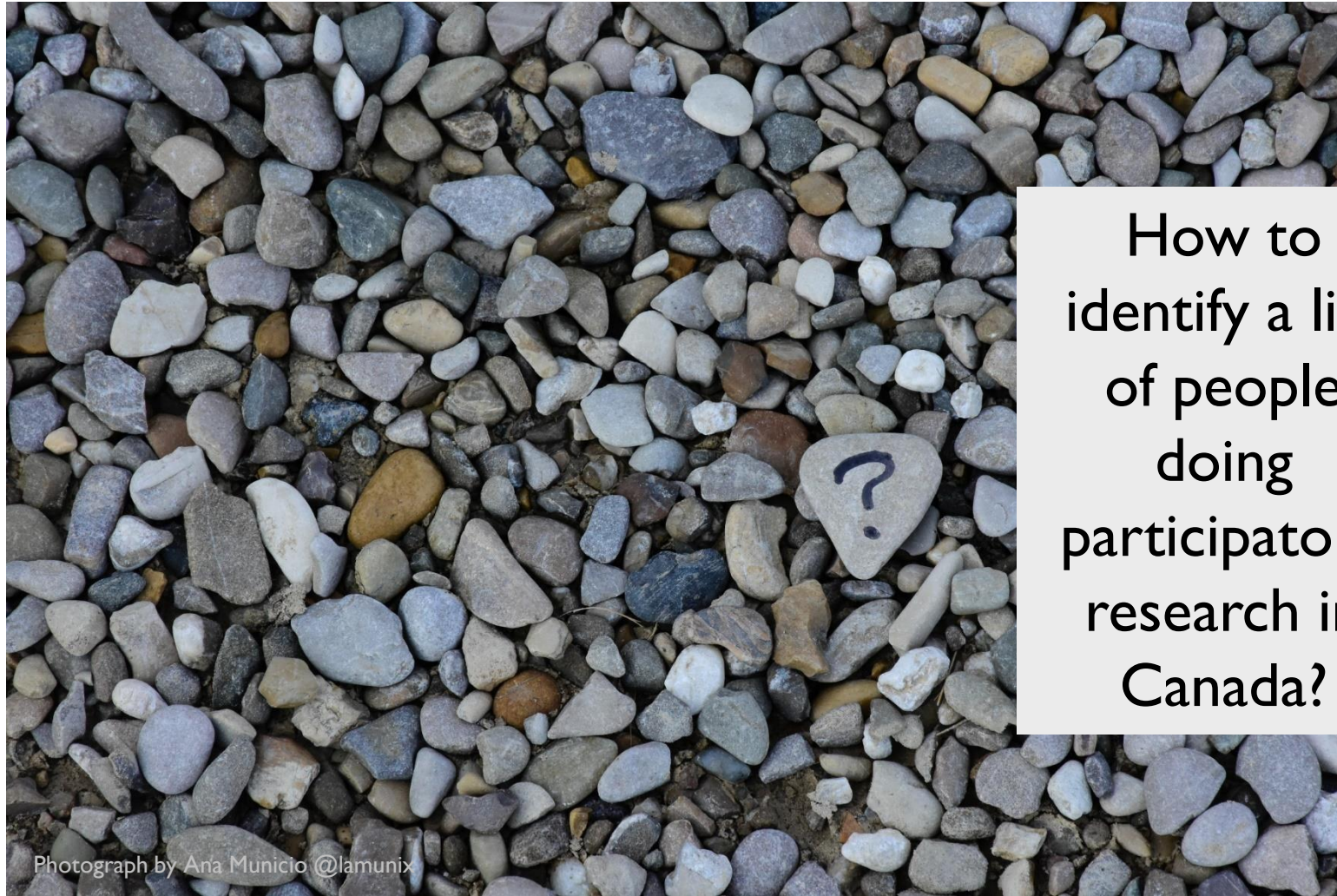

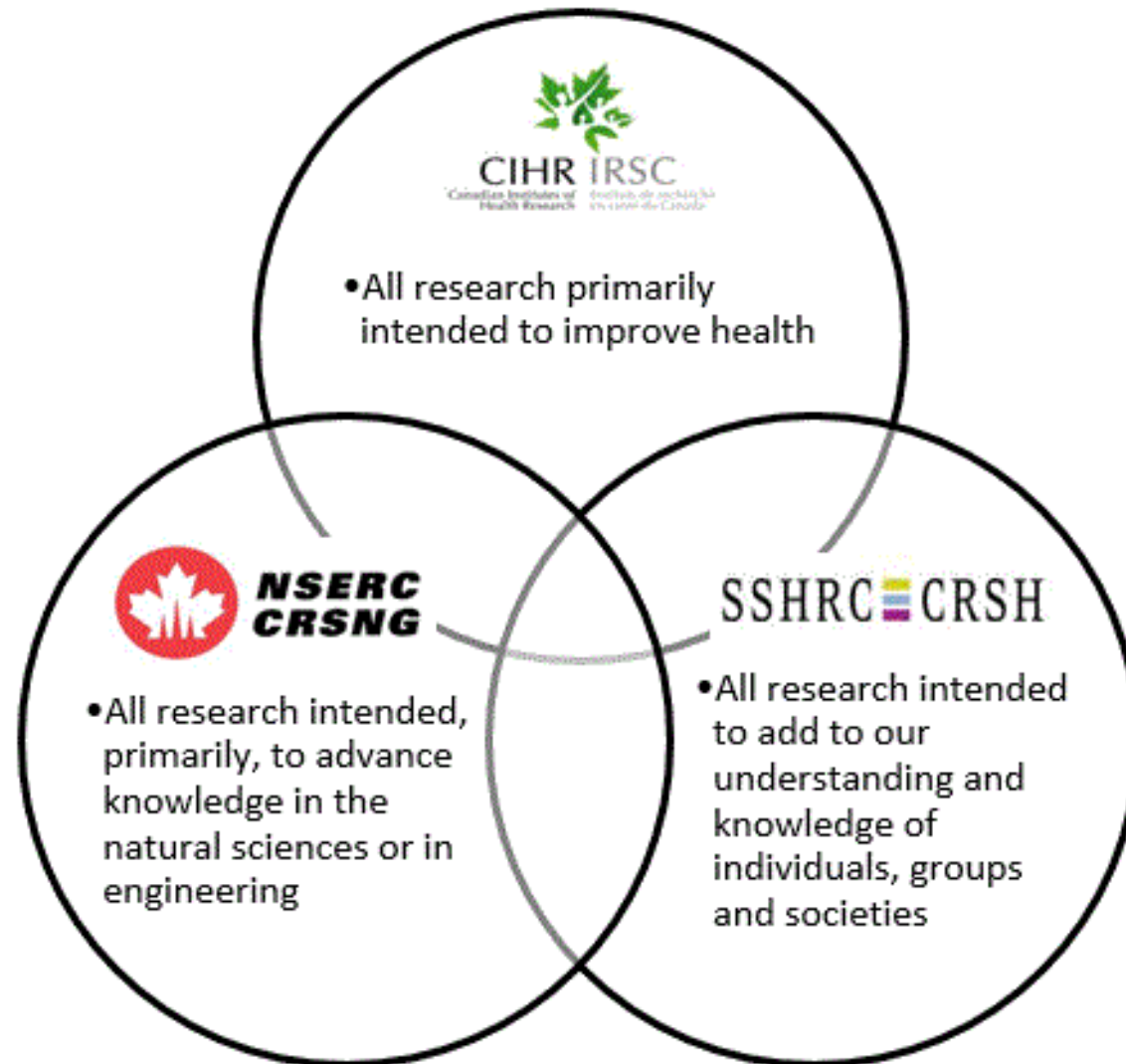

1. Obtain data from Tri-Agency about funded projects 2013-2018

2. Screen records and identify participatory research from titles and summaries

3. Identify random sample

4. Send online survey link and invitation to participate in interview to researchers

ADDITIONAL DETAILS ABOUT THE SURVEY

- Survey questions related to one specific project
- Could only send one survey to each principal investigator
 - If they have more than one grant, selected the older project
- Bilingual recruitment and survey (English/French)
 - Based on language of application
- Dilman Tailored Design Method (2014)
- Survey is not anonymous
 - Linking to original data from the TriAgency

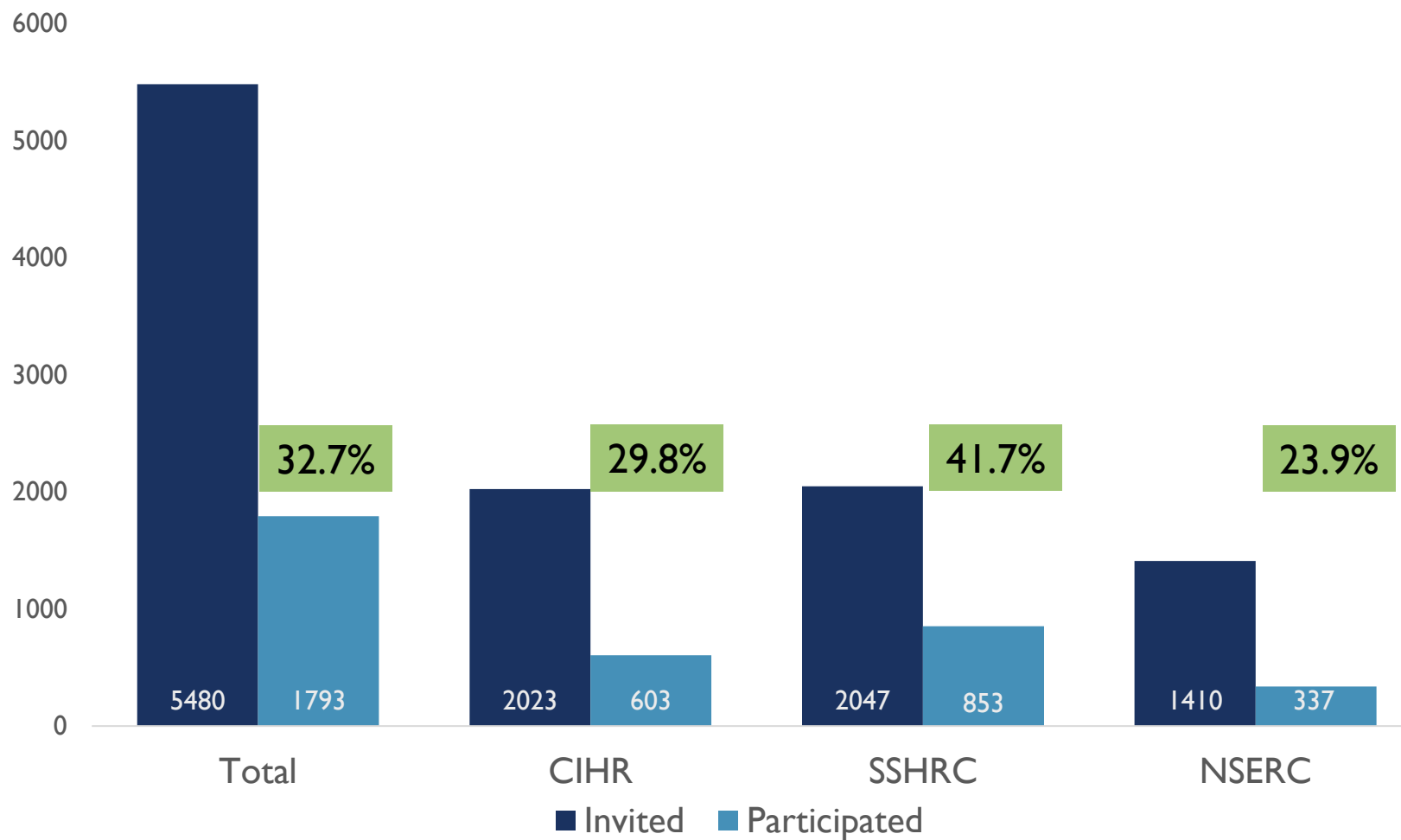

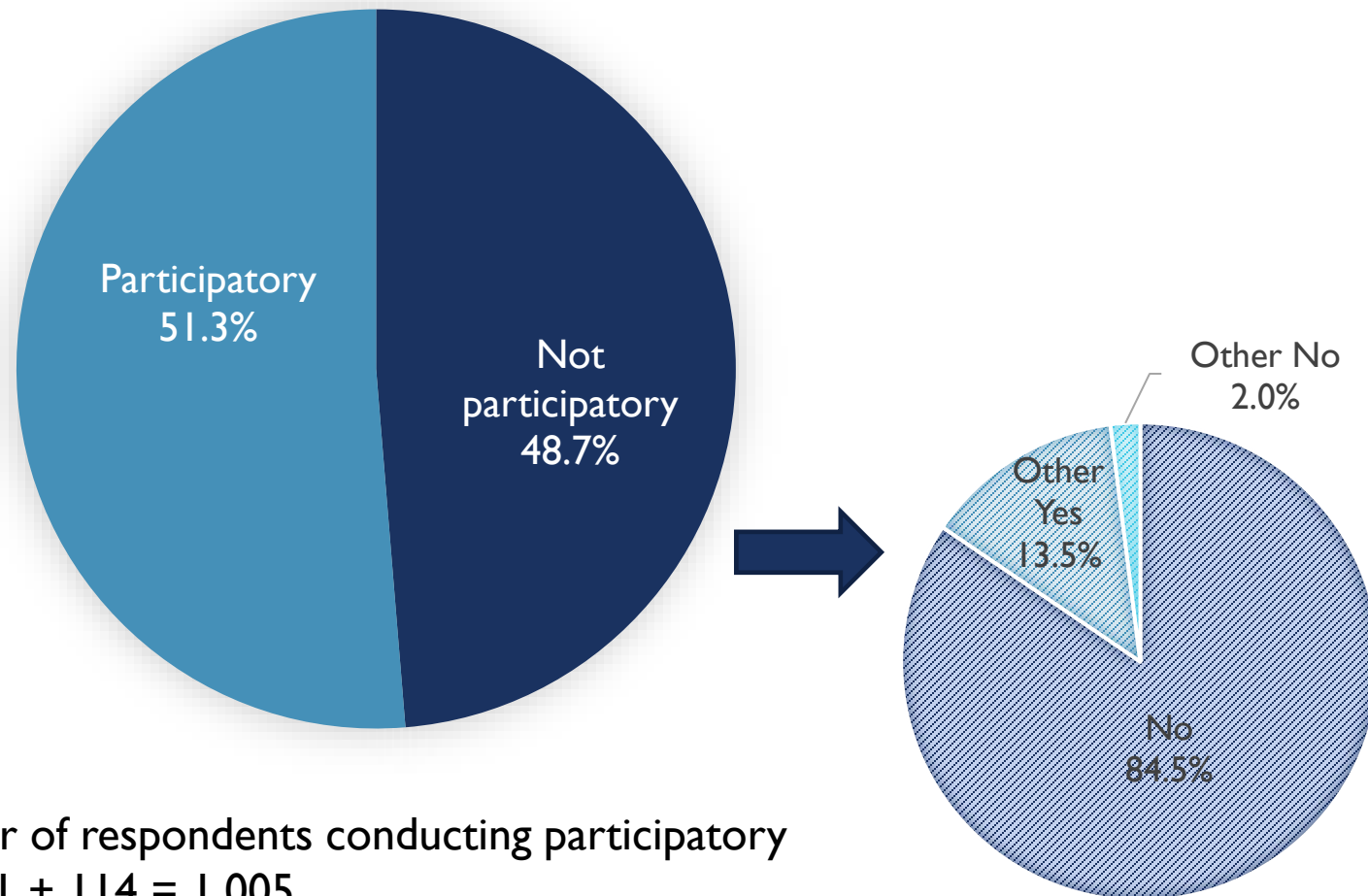

SHIFT SURVEY: PARTICIPATION RATES

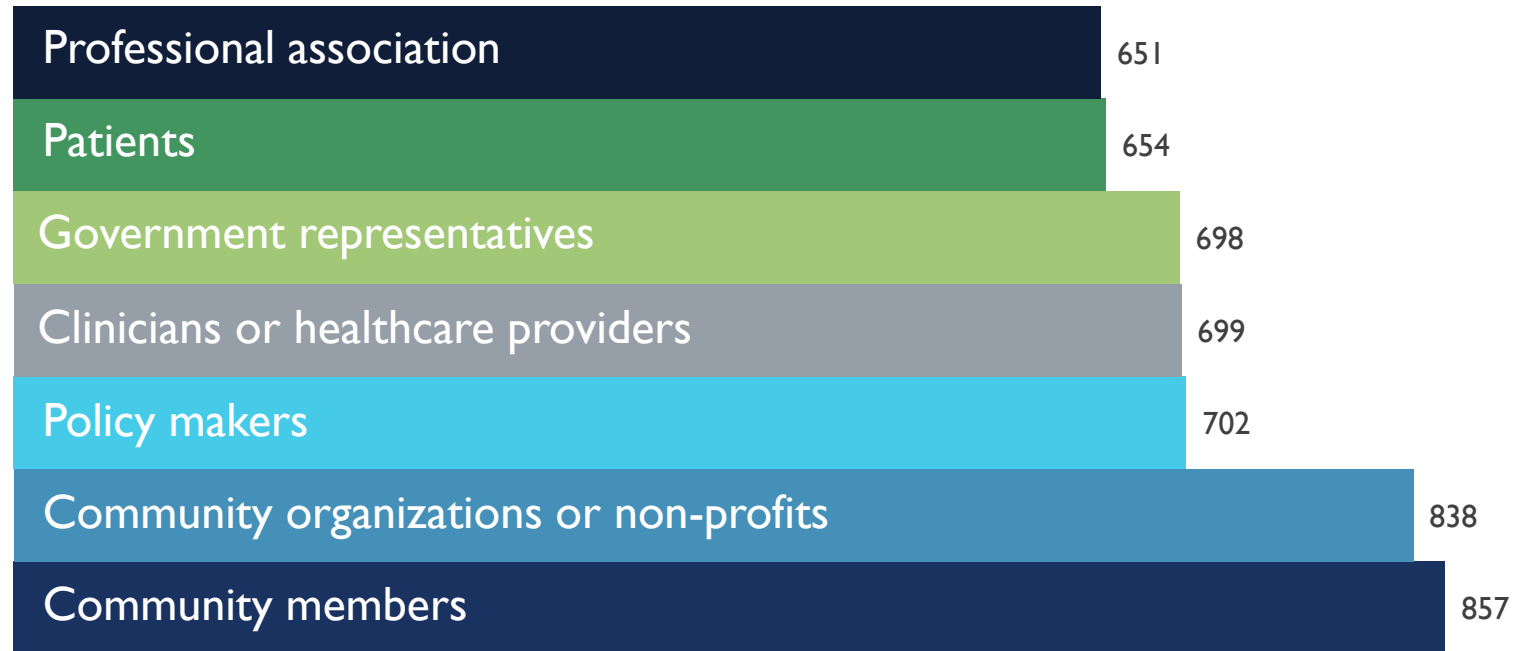


PARTICIPATORY RESEARCH RESPONDENTS

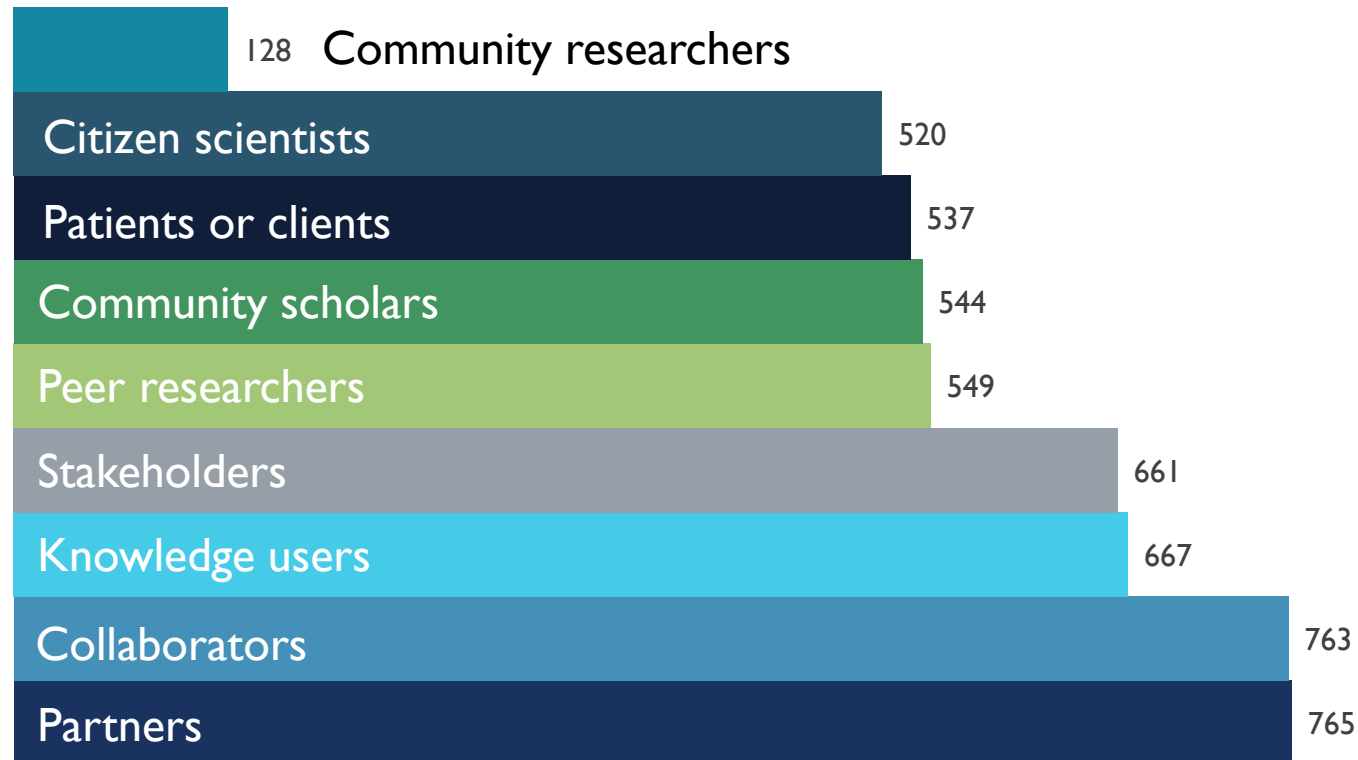


Total number of respondents conducting participatory research: $891 + 114 = 1,005$

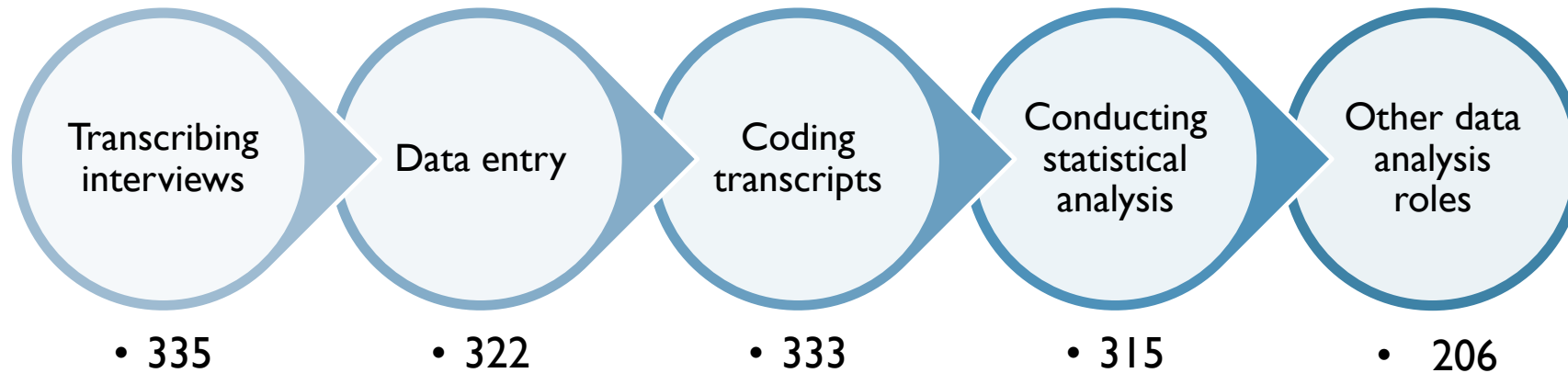

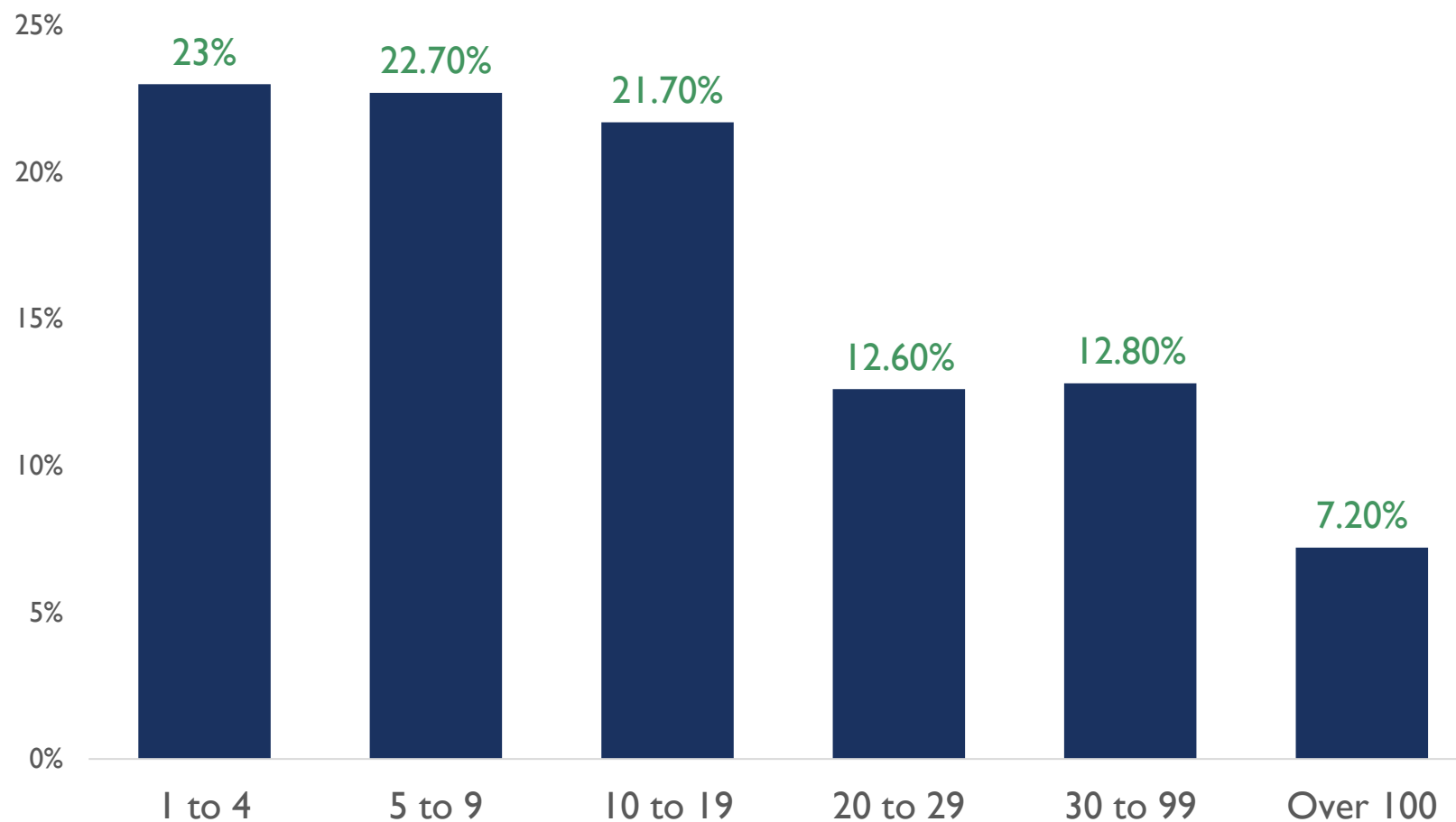

HOW MANY COMMUNITY STAKEHOLDERS WERE INVOLVED?



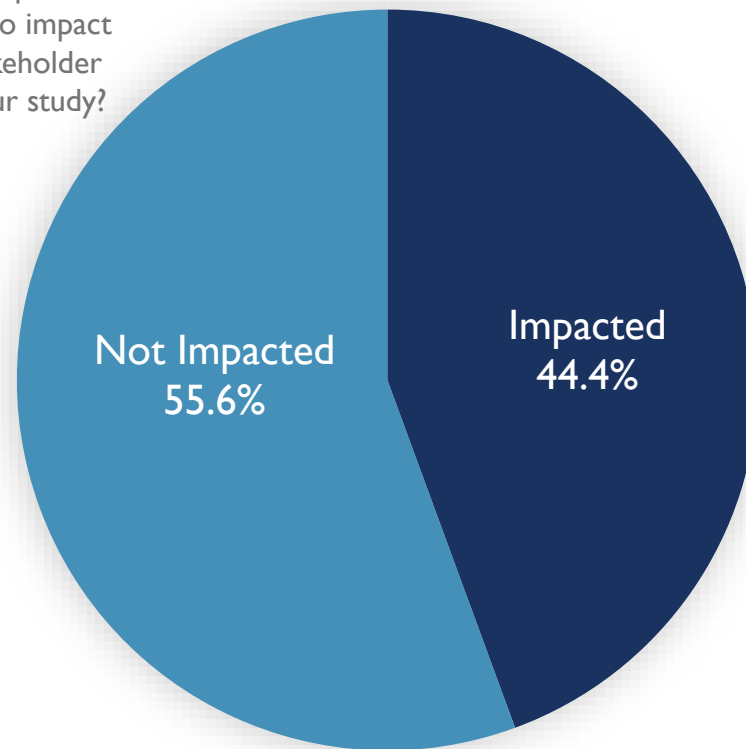


IMPACTS OF COVID-19

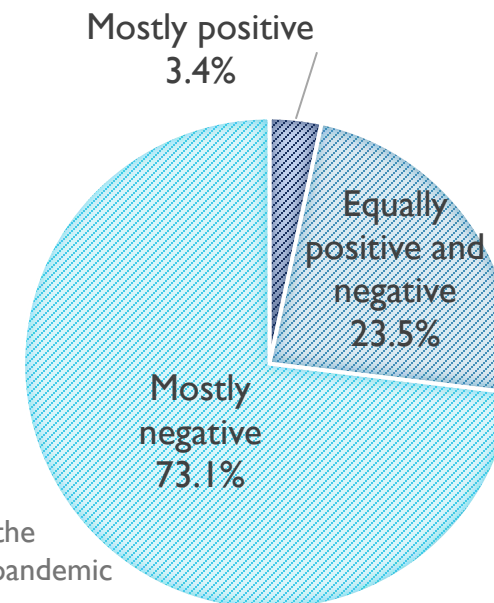


IMPACT OF COVID

Has the COVID-19 pandemic had an impact or no impact on community stakeholder participation in your study?



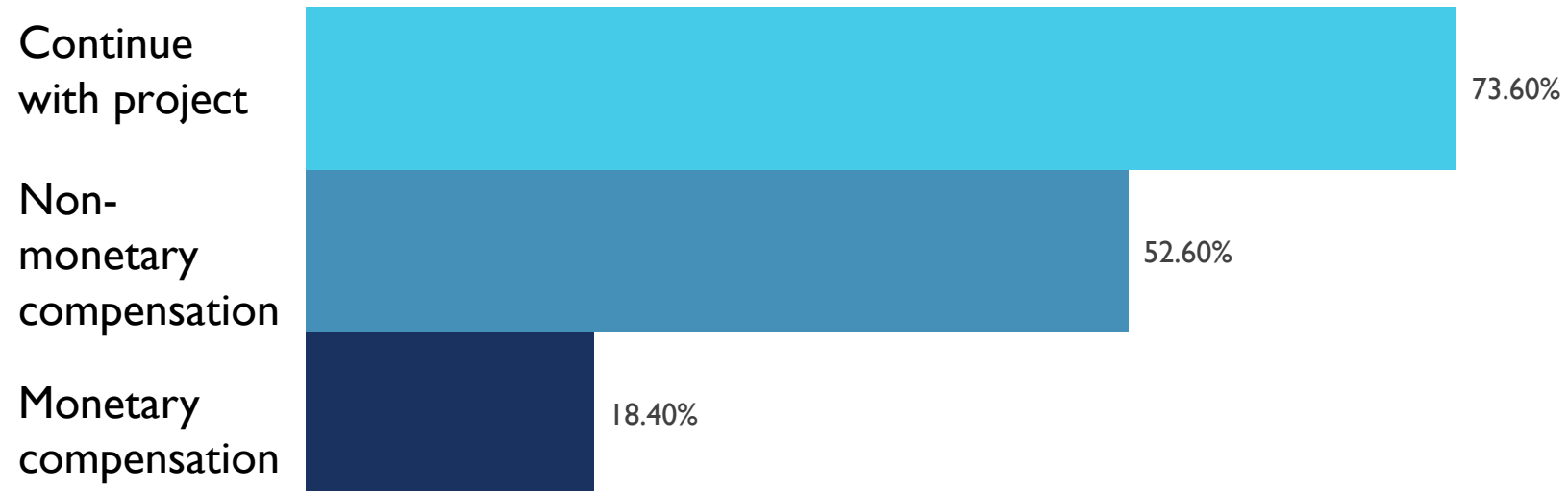
How would you describe the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on community stakeholder participation in your study?



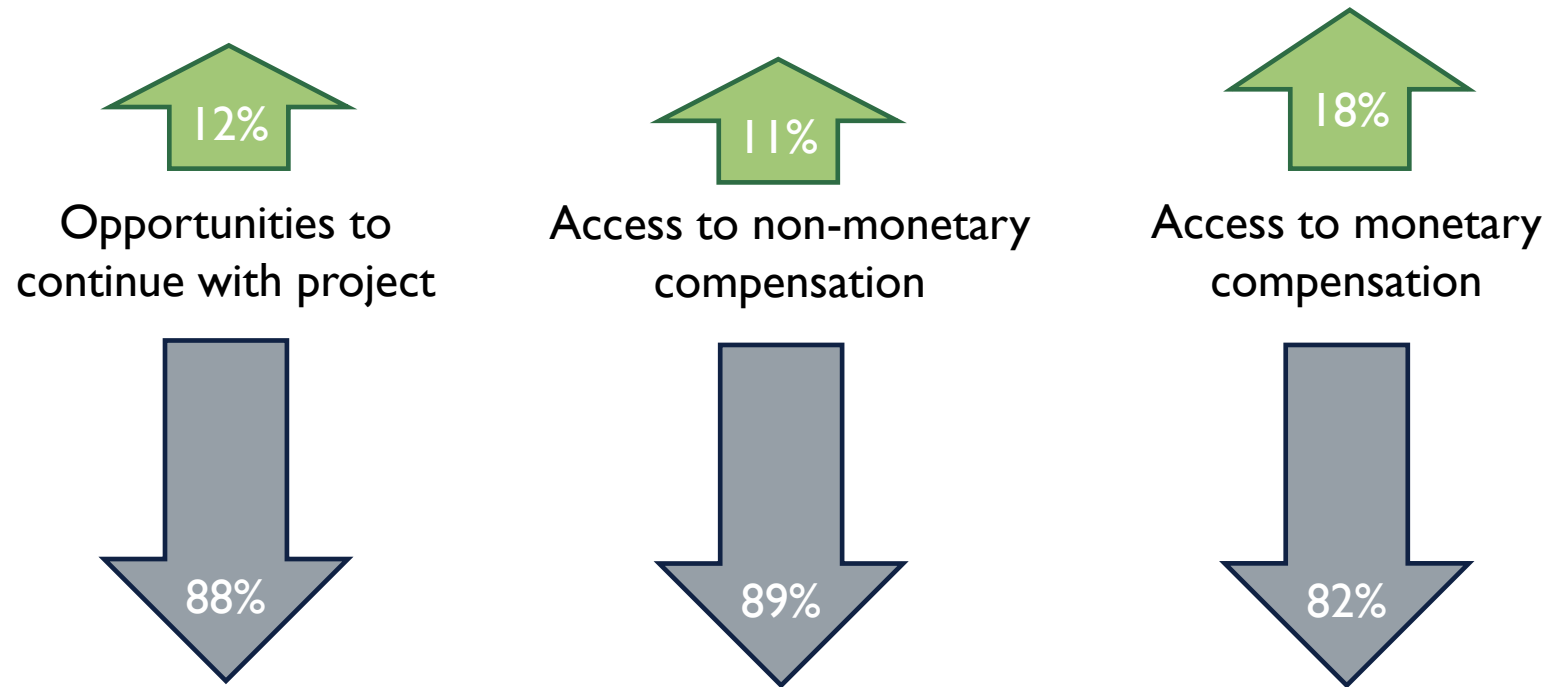
TYPES OF IMPACTS

- Impacts
 - Community stakeholders' access to monetary compensation
 - Community stakeholders' access to non-monetary compensation
 - Services, social support, training etc.
 - Opportunities for community stakeholders to continue with the same project

NEXT STEPS: SPECIFIC IMPACTS ON PEER
RESEARCHERS LIVING WITH HIV



PLANS FOR WINTER 2022

- Qualitative study focused on the impact of COVID-on peer researchers living with HIV
 - Conducted in partnership with Pacific AIDS Network
- In Phase I, we will conduct six online focus groups with 4-6 participants per group (total of 24-36 participants) bringing together peer researchers from key regions of the country
- Questions will explore the effect of the COVID-19 pandemic on income, social isolation, mental health, and HIV treatment with recommendations for how to minimize the impact of the pandemic going forward
- In Phase II, we will share the recommendations with academic HIV CBR researchers, HIV CBOs, and peer researchers themselves through established communities of practice
